Transition Year is a 1 year optional programme after the Junior Cycle


In Junior Cycle, students get a broad grounding in a wide variety of subjects

For Leaving Cert, students make choices about which subjects they wish to take



- Maths classes are reviewed at the start of 2nd year


Technical Graphics Speaker: Brendan

Some of the things that students will learn are:


- How to produce drawings using relevant equipment, freehand and using computers (SolidWorks)
- How to read and interpret drawings and diagrams
- Develop students' spatial and graphic skills
- Use a variety of media to produce sketches and use computer aided design to aid the process further
- Mathematically average or above an advantage
- Project worth 30%
- Assessed by exam at the end of 3rd year (worth 70%) ³¹


Classical Studies

Some of the things the students will learn are:

- Ancient Greek and Roman mythology
- Daily life in Ancient Greece and Rome
- Classical architecture and art



- Studies of Athens, Crete, Troy, Rome, Pompeii etc.
- Famous characters such as Socrates, Julius Caesar Cleopatra
- Warfare and conquest
- 2nd year CBA- create a myth
- 3rd year CBA- study a Roman structure


Some of the things that students will learn are:

- How to use freehand sketching to communicate ideas
- How to prepare a design drawing/plan
- How to read design drawings and make small projects
- The safe use of tools
- Project in 3rd Year (worth 70%)
- Strictly 24 per class (typically 3 class groups)

Home Economics Speaker: Claire

Some of the things that students will learn are:

- The human body healthy eating and nutrition
- Food studies nutrients, vitamins etc.
- Consumer studies—household budgeting, personal finances, saving etc.
- The home design, safety and hygiene
- Cooking
- Textiles and craftwork



Home Economics

Assessment for the Junior Cert consists of

- Two Classroom-Based Assessments (CBA)
- Creative Textiles and a Food Literacy Skills Brief
- ✤ A practical food skills examination (50% J Cycle exam)
- ✤ A written examination.

All assessments will be at a common level

Home Economics

Junior cycle Home Economics is made up of **three** main strands

- Food, Health and Culinary skills
- Responsible family living
- Textiles and Craft.



- Strong practical component with a Cookery skills exam in 3rd year worth 50%
- Recognises how important it is for young people to learn basic cookery skills which they can use throughout their life.
- Cookery classes in 1st, 2nd and 3rd year allow students to develop their culinary skills making nutritious but everyday dishes from scratch in an economical and sustainable way.







Junior Cert Project Work/CBA

Some of the things that students will learn are:

- Focus on 3 key areas: Composition, Performing and Listening
- How to read and write music
- Use new technology (recording equipment, making videos, recording compositions)
- Different genres of music- classical, folk, jazz etc.
- ✤ 30% of exam in 3rd year consists of a practical exam
- **NOTE:** The College does not provide or rent instruments

Strong interest in music desirable, prior experience playing an instrument would be an advantage
